SCHOOL FAREWELLS DEPUTY PRINCIPAL KAY THOMAS

At this end of the year we have farewell one of our Senior Leaders, Kay Thomas who is moving on to

new challenges in her career. The extent to which Ms Thomas has endeared herself to staff, students and community is evidenced by the succession of fond leave-takings in many of the final ceremonies of the term. At Junior and Senior prize givings she was acknowledged by the school and honoured by tributes from our Kapa haka group. At the Maori Campus Graduation her special contribution and closeness to students and the whanau was marked by presentations. In a special farewell ceremony from staff she was presented with a taonga by Principal Mr Watson and her years of faithful service were celebrated



by many staff who spoke about their memories of her time at the school and her service to students, staff and community.

After a distinguished career as HOD English at Auckland Girls Grammar School and many years involvement in setting a model for engaging teaching in her subject, Kay Thomas joined MRGS as a Deputy Principal in 2004. During her time in the position she held a number of portfolios such as assessment, reporting, teacher appraisal, Education Outside the Classroom—while at the same time supporting the work of houses and a range of subject departments. In all her work she brought a measured, collaborative approach with a clear eye on process, rigor, assurance and equity. In his own tribute Mr Watson made the following comments: "Two things stand out for me about Kay's leadership.

Firstly her ability to draw together approximate ideas and write them succinctly and purposefully. She says she developed this skill whilst on The BoT at AGS. Kay was instrumental in writing the lengthy proposal that gained the school significant EHSAS funding in 2008. This is the founding action for the development of MERGE and also the professional learning model that we now operate. As you know MERGE has grown to embrace a wide range of areas including writing, sports, tikanga Maori and Mathematics. This work will support our steps toward forming a community of schools.

Secondly is Kay's absolute caring for our students. *All* of our students. She mentored before mentoring. She is skilled and genuine in her actions knowing how to work with students. In particular Kay's ability to work with some of our more formidable young men sticks in the mind. Somehow she was able to get alongside and guide students in need through difficult moments. There are many students whose tenure at the school was enabled, perhaps extended as a result of Kay's care and persistence. Always gentle always firm, apparently fearless and with a purpose behind the calm. Kay thank you for your leadership and contribution."

As a community we wish Kay all the best for her future and treasure her contribution to our learning journeys in the last decade.



JUNIOR PRIZE GIVING

Our annual celebration of Junior achievement took place on the last day of term. The large audience of prize winners, students, special guests and families came together to mark the powerful learning and active citizenship of our year 9 and 10 students with awards and certificates. The Board chairperson Ms Pot opened the event with reference to the continued high achievement and growth of the school. Mr Watson, the Principal, followed her with a survey of the year's success in our learning community. This included a special recognition of Deputy Principal Ms. Kay Thomas who is leaving us to pursue other pathways in her educational career. 


JUNIOR PRIZEGIVING—DEPUTY HEAD PREFECT PRAVEEN KRISHNA'S SPEECH

Keynotes each year of our Junior Prizegiving are the farewell speeches of our Prefect leaders—we publish below one of them—an inspirational challenge to all those of Roskill to be resilient and work hard..

"Hockey is a sport I've played for the last 8 years. But it's only this year that I've really found a passion for it. For the last 3 years, I've woken up at quarter to 6 nearly every Friday morning for 3 terms of the year. I've spent Monday afternoons playing in exhausting heat and horrible rain. And I've won, lost, drawn and even had to forfeit games on Wednesday nights. And this year I have loved every single moment of it. I'm lucky enough to be able to say that I have found something that can either make my day or completely ruin it. I think I realised this during one moment at tournament.

It was half time in the final and the score was one all. We had



conceded our first goal of the whole tournament and the threat of coming so far just to lose was very real. The previous night we had given our coach a greenstone pendant that represented strength, courage and mana. He pulled the necklace out from around his neck and he said to us:

"You gave me this that represents all these things. Now why don't you go out there and show some of that. Get back out and put your heart into it." I stood there and listened and I got angry. Really angry. I was angry at myself and angry at my team. But I couldn't help but force a smile out because I realised that I had found something that could make me feel this way.

Looking back it seems kind of weird. Why am I getting so emotional over what is essentially 22 people running after a single ball with branches in their hands. But I figure it's more than that. When I step on the turf I aim to be a little better than I was yesterday. When I play a match, I play to win. Every time. When I play you can tell if I'm angry or upset not just because of the colourful language but because it shows.

I think all of us here today are pretty lucky in the sense that we go to a school where there are plenty of opportunities. It makes it a lot easier to find something worth being passionate about —whether it be in the academics, sports or arts. I challenge you all to take a few risks and try new things. Find your thing. It may take a while. It took me 7 years to realise how much I loved what I was already doing. The more you try, the more you learn.

And remember to always be prepared to work hard for it because it won't always be easy or enjoyable. But know that success will come to those who dedicate everything to their passion. I'll admit I'm not the best hockey player. I'm not even the best in the team. But I will never stop trying."






PREFECT TEAM FOR 2015 BEGIN LEADERSHIP JOURNEY

PARENTAL CONTRIBUTION

Thank you to families who have paid their donation. Your support really makes a big difference! Last year voluntary parental donations assisted the school in providing a wide range of equipment including specialist sports equipment for Physical Education and a data projector for the school hall. The data projector is proving to be excellent for a range of student meetings and also for performing arts groups.

This year following the huge upgrade of our ICT network with ultrafast broadband and wireless capability we are wanting to provide class sets of laptops and tablets (computers on wheels) to a wider range of classes. Pilot programmes last year were very successful. We would also like to complete Phase 2 of the hall projector system which includes cameras and an improved sound system to enhance student performances. CLOSURE OF ERNIE PINCHES FOOTBRIDGE

Ernie Pinches Footbridge which runs across the motorway will be closed for four months from the end of September to undertake essential widening works as part of the Waterview Connection.

The bridge is being extended to allow for the addition of an extra northbound lane between Dominion Road and Maioro Street. One pier will be completely removed and another replaced with a cable stay pylon. 22M of the existing bridge deck will also be replaced

The bridge will be closed during these works, however the footpath on the western side will remain open. Pedestrians are recommended to use an alternative route via the Maioro Street interchange into Stoddard Road as shown in the photo below.



Park safely outside schools

Before and after school is a busy time for everyone. Parking rules help protect our children and keep them safe. Drivers who park illegally put our kids at risk.

This term parking officers will be on patrol outside your school to issue tickets to those who are illegally parked.

Fines for illegal parking include: Parked on the footpath or grass verge/ \$40 Parked across or within 1m of a vehicle \$40 Parked within 6m either side of an unmarked \$40 bus stop Parked within a marked bus stop \$60 Parked within 0.5m of a fire hydrant with no one in the car legally capable of moving it \$60 Parked within a designated bus lane, transit or cycle lane \$60 Parked on a clearway \$60 Double parked \$60 Inconsiderate parking to other road users, including pedestrians \$60 Parked on or within 6m of an intersection \$60 Parked on a pedestrian crossing \$60 Parked on a broken yellow line \$60



PICK UP AND DROP OFF INFORMATION FOR CAMPUS SCHOOLS

In the interests of student safety on the roads around the school we have printed below the details of suggested safe pickup and drop off places that the three campus schools are encouraging families to use.
