### **NEWSLETTER – JUNE 2012**

#### Nga mihi nui ki a koutou

It's been a term full of achievement and special events. Some highlights have been the excellent school production of 'Bye Bye Birdie', the Campus celebration of Matariki, the sport exchanges with Mahurangi College and Pukekohe High School, success in the 'Bring it On Dance' competition and an outstanding assembly speech by Joshua losefo. Term 2 ends with the School Ball at Eden Park on Saturday 30 June. On the sport field the 1<sup>st</sup> XI Girls Hockey team won the Open B championship and our academy sports teams are competing with distinction in the top grade of their respective championships.



One of our school goals this year is to increase the number of students gaining NCEA at each of the three levels by 5%. Achieving this would result in an additional 70 students gaining NCEA thus increasing the range of options at their next level of learning. One of our strategies to achieve this goal is to provide regular tracking updates to students about their progress towards NCEA qualifications. Additionally we have initiated mentoring conversations with all Year 11 students to help shape student thinking about their learning. Our teachers are working hard towards this goal together with goals to improve students writing skills and aligning NCEA standards with the New Zealand Curriculum.

A teacher only day is scheduled for Monday 16 July to continue this work. Term 3 will begin for students on Tuesday 17 July.

#### **Parental Donations and Sports Fees**

Thank you to all caregivers who have made their parental donation already after the recent invoices were sent out. The parental donation is \$180.00 per student or \$300.00 per family. Every effort is made to keep school costs to a minimum but to ensure that we offer quality educational opportunities we encourage payment of these costs. The parental donation assists in meeting the costs of providing classroom and sports equipment. #### TEACHER ONLY DAY MONDAY 16<sup>TH</sup> JULY

There will be a Teacher Only Day at Mount Roskill Grammar School on the first Monday after the holiday break, 16<sup>th</sup> July. **The school term for students will start on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> July** at the normal time of 8.40am. The Teacher Only Day will be used by staff to work on school strategic developments; staff professional learning and Departmental work on course alignment.

#### ACADEMIC TRACKING AND MENTORING

Research shows that students' achievement and motivation increases if they receive accurate and timely data about their progress and participate in conversations informed by that data on how to improve their achievement. Consequently, the school has developed a draft long term vision that "in 3-5 years, each learner, their family and a key staff member are engaged in on-going evidence based conversations to set and advance specific learning goals".

To achieve our vision we are introducing academic tracking and mentoring. Academic tracking is the provision of data on student progress and achievement to students and parents, while academic mentoring is having evidence based conversations around the setting of and progress towards specific academic goals.

To help with academic tracking, all senior stuents are being issued with a regular tracking sheet that shows their progress towards achieving NCEA. The tracking sheet shows such information as the number of credits achieved, the number still to be attained, the quality of the credits achieved and progress made towards attaining literacy and numeracy. The first tracking sheet was issued to students on the 16<sup>th</sup> May and the second sheet is being issued with senior reports on the 29<sup>th</sup> June.

In 2012 we are focussing on mentoring Year 11 students and all teachers are involved in mentoring conversations with these students. The first mentoring conversations occurred on the 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> June. Teachers and students discussed students' progress towards achieving NCEA and together decided on goals to help improve achievement.

You may be wondering how you can help with this process. Asking your son or daughter to explain their tracking sheets and discuss their academic goals with you would support them in their learning. #### **SCHOOL BALL 2012**

The school ball will take place this Saturday evening, June 30<sup>th</sup>, at Eden Park. As ever the school is looking forward to a great occasion when year 13 and other senior students can come together in their 'finest' to enjoy a meal and dance. All those attending have been made clearly aware of the school's expectations during the ball and the arrangements for arrival and departure times from the event. We are aware that students spend a great deal of time and money to prepare for this evening and the school's organisation and support together with the responsible cooperation of all students involved make this a special occasion in the school calendar.

#### BARISTA AWARD WINNERS

Last week two Mount Roskill students took gold medals and one of them received a Prime Gold award in Manukau Institute of Technology's Junior Barista Competition. Carlo Grunwald and Huihua Xie, both Year 13 students, upheld the co-curricular spirit of the school by triumphing over 12 other schools from the Auckland region. Each heat of the event was organised around two barista machines each being worked by an individual student. Everyone had a 20 minute time period to set-up their equipment, make 2 espressos, 2 flat whites and 2 lattes and then clean up. They were then graded on technique and use of equipment before being assessed by a second judge on the quality of the coffees they produced. Carlo, who was the overall competition winner, triumphed with 99 out of a possible 100 points. In the competition our two students showed the expertise they have developed as part of their Food and Hospitality course. Both demonstrated their mastery of coffee making it an exciting night of barista magic.

#### LANGUAGE PERFECT WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS



Students from Mount Roskill took part in the 2012 Language Perfect Worldwide Languages Competition. Students over a 10 day period spent many hours at school and at home learning and revising vocabulary expressions from а number of different languages. They then answered questions accumulated individual scores. MRGS students answered 1.4 million questions, scoring 453,122 points. (Language

Perfect competitors worldwide answered 102 million questions). The school had outstanding results:

- \* Overall = 4<sup>th</sup> in World / 2<sup>nd</sup> in New Zealand
- \* Maori = 2nd in World (1st in NZ)
- \* Japanese = 3rd in World (2nd in NZ)
- \* French = 4th in World (2nd in NZ)

**2 students gained an ELITE award** (10,000+ points): Joshua Simmons (12,630), Sephie Liu (10,382) and we achieved **46 GOLD AWARDS** (3,000+ points); **28 SILVER Awards** (2,000+ points), **72 BRONZE Awards** (1,000+ points) and **62 CREDIT Awards** (500+ points).

#### MODEL UNITED NATIONS

Akshaya Kumar, Anagha Sridhar and Athurva Kulkarni formed a group of three students who represented Mount Roskill Grammar in the Auckland Model United Nations in June. The Model United Nations is an annual event where students from schools around Auckland and Northland gather together to debate issues of global importance. This year, Mount Roskill Grammar represented Malaysia and spoke on issues such as child labour and countries' treatment of their indigenous peoples. Anagha, Akshaya and Athurva prepared and delivered well-researched and thoughtful arguments to the delegation. Their efforts were recognised with an award for the top representatives in the Asian Block, an award they received from key note speaker and Leader of the Opposition, Mr David Shearer. The students represented both the country of Malaysia and Mount Roskill Grammar admirably and we are thrilled to see such global awareness and political passion in our students.

#### PEER LIFE MENTORSHIP TRAINING



On Sunday 17th and Monday Mediators 18th June. 40 experienced an advanced training in mentorship skills facilitated by Julie McCracken from MINDFLOW. This dynamic, inspiring, interactional, fun-filled presentation trained the students how build relationships. communicate effectively, solve problems, set

goals and many other skills. These are all important life skills, not only for themselves and for the young students they will help in their Mentoring role. This course also helps to achieve two Level 2 credits.

#### STUDY SKILLS BOOKLET HELPING YOUR CHILD TO STUDY

Year 11 students have been given a Study Skills booklet during this last week of term 2. Please ask your child to show it to you and have a read of it yourself. Within the Study Tips section there are directions on creating a Study Timetable. Work with your child to ensure they complete one on the template provided. Also get them to complete the calendar, including important dates. They can find dates for specific exams on the NCEA website. Year 12 or 13 students have received a Study Skills programme in the past, however if they would like a copy of this booklet they can get it from the Learning Extension Department.

#### HOW TO RETAIN WHAT YOU LEARN IN CLASS

(extracts from an article which draws together advice from different sources to help with study). There is no magic pill/quick fix when it comes to successful study There are four stages to the learning process that should be followed on a regular basis, not just before exams, says Massey student learning services manager Ken Cage.

"Reading, making notes, committing notes to memory and retrieving those mental notes during an exam."

Daily summarising is a good place to start. By summarizing notes at the end of the day you improve your recall and get another chance to go over what you are learning, "It is well documented that if you go over information within 24 hours you have 90% recall. After three days you have 30%."

This doesn't mean copying but finding ways to note take that jogs your memory later: for instance notebooks, mindmaps, flash cards. Studying in small chunks with five-minute breaks every 20 minutes is better - . If we study too much the brain tunes out.

Finding memory techniques that work for you is another key.

**Chaining**, for example, helps you remember information in sequence. This is where you associate visual images of a list of key words with one another to remember the words.

**Acrostics or mnemonics**; creating a sentence or rhyme out of the first letters of key words.

**Creating visual associations**- a large packet of felt tips and use colour. Chart things or draw pictures of something visually interesting.

**Auditory learners** could replay tapes of themselves reading the information or repeating it aloud.

**Mind mapping** - You start by placing your page landscape then you write your topic in the middle of the page. Branch out with key words and connect to other facts and ideas using colours to show different themes.

**Time management** is often the underlying issue "People underestimate the time it takes" have clear and modest goals about what you expect to achieve each day.

**Discussion groups** are an invaluable way to come to grips with an essay topic and start putting ideas into words because it is easier to write about something you've discussed with others.

Working with others also helps you become organised.

Please ensure you name all clothing so if it is left behind somewhere it can be returned to you.

#### **DONATIONS OF UNIFORM**

Do you have items of Uniform that are no longer in use? If so, the School would greatly appreciate any donations of uniform items – even socks! This allows us to lend an item to students who require it. Any donations would be gladly received and can be dropped off either at the Deans' Centre or the Admin Office.

#### **ATTENDANCE**

A key indicator of academic success is attendance at school. It is vital that students attend school regularly. A few missed days here and there quickly add up to a large amount of lost learning opportunities. It is important to keep students at home if they are unwell, however, a slight cold should not prevent them coming to school. It is the student's responsibility to catch up; so upon their return it is important for them to ask their Teachers for work they may have missed. If your child is going to be absent through illness for a period of longer than a few days, we encourage you to contact your child's Dean who can arrange work for them to do. If you are taking your child out of school for any length of time for a planned event, you will need to apply for leave – see the Attendance Officer, Mrs Hyland.

#### **PUNCTUALITY**

With the cold and darkness making it more difficult to get out of bed in the morning, we ask that you assist your child to wake up with enough time to get ready and make it to school. It is important for them to get into a routine of waking up on time. It might be helpful to either assist them with setting an alarm or ensuring they are out of bed by a certain time. School begins with morning roll check at 8:40am except for Wednesday which has a late start straight into Period 1 at 9:20am. Too often when students are late we get the excuse of "I just slept in" or "traffic". Waking up on time is a controllable factor and heavy traffic is to be expected on wet days especially when trying to get to school by 8:40. This is a good opportunity to help our students develop good self-management skills and we ask for your assistance in this.

## TERM 2 SPORTS EXCHANGES -MAHURANGI COLLEGE AND PUKEKOHE HIGH SCHOOL



Early in the term we held the annual sports exchange with Mahurangi College at their Warkworth campus. Seven of our senior teams made the journey accompanied by coaches and the MRGS Kapa Haka group. The performance group took part in the formal welcomes which heralded a marvellous day of inter-school competition. As ever with Mahurangi there was fierce but sporting competition right down to the last game of netball.
