FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

Our junior prize giving completed a fantastic year with a celebration of achievement and learning purpose. Thank you to families and friends who joined with us in recognising the success of so many students. Especial congratulations to Kate Bonnici and Ayla Hawthorne who were first overall students in year 9 and 10 respectively, and to Sarah Mckenzie and Tessa Brown who were second overall in year 9 and 10. We also recognised the broad range of achievement of our junior students over the year.



- 17 students were finalists at the NIWA Science and Technology fair where they gained 5 highly commended awards and three prizes for first place.
- 9 students gained elite awards in the language perfect world championships with year 10 student Tessa Brown placing in the top 60 students in the world.
- Year 9 and 10 students Sarah and Caroline Yan were joint winners of the Auckland Girls Chess Championship and year 10 student Thea Dickson gained third place in the under 16 competition.
- Our junior academy hockey boys and girls teams were both runners-up in their grades.
- Our under 14 rugby boys team made their grade semi-finals and the under 15 boys won their grade.
- Junior girls made up a good portion of the girls senior 10 a side rugby team who went unbeaten until the Auckland final. A number of these players represented Auckland.
- Both under 15 rugby teams competed at the National Sevens competition last week making the quarter finals, the girls coming an outstanding 5th and the boys 7th.
- The year 13 football academy played in the top grade in Auckland for their age. Several of these students played for the first XI who won promotion to the Auckland secondary schools premier senior competition for 2016.
- The junior A boys cricket team won their grade with only 3 losses in 12 games.
- The under 15 boys basketball team won their grade with 9 wins and 1 loss.
- Many girls took up Lacrosse and several year 10 students have been selected for the Auckland Development team.
- Our gymnastics and trampolining squads continue to produce great results at regional at national level.

We are proud of our year 9 and 10 students who are lifting the bar!

Congratulations also to year 13 student Toru Arakua who has been selected for the senior New Zealand women's league team - the Black Ferns to play Australia during the NRL nines in February. This is an outstanding achievement.

A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES CHAIR

This last newsletter of 2015 allows us to reflect on the year's achievements. The MRGS Vision is that *all students will be successful, powerful learners who are active and responsible citizens* and that our professional and highly motivated staff will challenge thinking and grow knowledge through inquiry and quality learning programmes.

While students look at their own individual achievement, the Board of Trustees role is to look at achievement across the school; we look at the big picture. One of those big picture views is the Education Review Office's monitoring by the Ministry of Education and we have worked to ensure that



we gain the highest achievement possible - a 4-5 year review. This year ERO visited the school and the result is that their next visit will be in 4-5 years. Achieving this for a second time is a reflection of the quality of teaching at MRGS.

The MOE has set targets for the achievement of students by the year 2017. The goal is that 85% of school leavers will achieve NCEA level 2 or above. 85% must also be achieved for Maori and Pasifika students. MRGS is 10% above the national average at 85.2%. We are also higher than the national average for Maori and Pasifika students. There are still gains to be made but it is tracking in the right direction.

Another measure of success of student learning is how many students stay at school until they are 17 years old. At MRGS the retention rate is 91% compared to a national average of 83%.

We could also look at the measure of how many of our students attend a tertiary institution. It is 52% at MRGS compared to 35% nationally. MRGS has lifted the achievement of all students. The students and the community value education and have confidence in their ability to achieve and, as shown by the results, do achieve.

One of the BoT strategic goals is to Strengthen Partnerships within our Community and as part of this the Ministry of Education in Auckland is supporting our proposal for a community of 5 schools including Three Kings Primary School and Dominion Road Primary School - together with the three Roskill Campus schools we will extend the sharing and consistency of learning. Our Mentoring program also strengthens community partnerships and has grown in strength and attendance rates.

The strategic goal of Developing Facilities to Promote Quality Educational Experiences has resulted in a new football turf this year and the hockey turf will be upgraded over summer into a water based turf. The new electronic signage at the gate allows communication with the community about events and achievements.

Schools aren't just about academic learning. Many students will have participated in events, coached teams, been a mentor or leader, participated in extra curricular activities and contributed to the wider life of school. Thank you to all of the staff who make these events possible for students.

The BoT would like to thank all of the staff who work at this school for their commitment to the education of students. Thank you also to those families, businesses and staff who provide financial, coaching, mentoring and tuition support to the school.

We wish you all a safe holiday and look forward to seeing the students and staff back at school next year, well rested.

HOCKEY TURF RE-DEVELOPMENT

The first two stages —(pictured below)has involved clearing the existing facility—initially the bollards and side barriers and taking off the old playing surface and to start clearance of the site so that the full re—constitution and groundworks can be carried out. It will be fascinating to see the various stages of the transformation of the site as we work towards the new water-based turf that will be such an asset to the school and its community.




ROSKILL STUDENT JOINS FLAG DEBATE

It was created by the visionary Yvonne Duncan, pioneered at MRGS by the late Margaret Stanners, followed by the dedicated Jill Gardener. I was lucky enough to be given the opportunity to be the Peer Mediation Coordinator at MRGS 13 years ago.

I have the privilege of working with hundreds of students, witnessing the positive change they have made within themselves, their relationships and their school community. The students have taught me so much about collaboration, stop bullying, challenge prejudices and organise activities like 'International Peace Week', so that peace and diversity can be celebrated and protected.




CHANGES TO THE SCHOOL DAY FOR 2016

Over the past two years the school has been reviewing its provision of learning in the junior school and has pursued its vision to make learning in years 9 and 10 as interesting as possible and the best possible base for senior learning. This has resulted in changes to subject choices in the junior school with a deepening of learning opportunities in certain subjects and the introduction of academies in a range of areas. As part of this continuing process of strengthening learning provision we are making changes to the way the week at Roskill will look in 2016. The changes will make the times of the day simple and straightforward.

For 2016 the school will have a new timetable in which:

- There are 25 periods per week (rather than the previous 27 periods) so no lessons will be rotated off.
- Every lesson will be 55 minutes long
- LCT— Learning Capability Time will be three times a week for 30 minutes each time (It will be
 more like a lesson and focusing on learning.) Everyone in the form class will be there.
- Assemblies will only be on Monday. On the first week of a two week cycle -there will be a school
 assembly. On the second week there will be house assemblies strengthening the idea of the
 house being a 'school within a school'.
- School will still finish at 3.10 pm
- School will start a little later at 9.00 am. The expectation is that with a 9.00am start everyone has plenty of time to get ready and be on time for learning. It also means that there will be some time before school when teams or student groups might choose to meet.
- Otherwise the school day will be the same. There will be 5 lessons, lunch will be after period 4 followed by assembly or LCT.
