We are delighted that in 2008 MRGS students gained an exceptional 74 scholarships. MRGS is also proud to have another Premier Scholar – one of only ten in New Zealand. Following on from Chuang Zheng Lee's Premier Scholar award last year, Timothy Vogel gained six scholarship passes including four outstanding scholarships. He is also the top Chemistry student in New Zealand. Timothy will receive his Premier Scholar award from the Governor General in Wellington in May. Two other students, Andy Liu and Caleb Saunders each gained five scholarships passes and this has placed them in the top 50 students in the nation as 'outstanding scholars'.

The NCEA results included in this newsletter show that academic success is pervasive in the school. Pass rates for NCEA, literacy, numeracy, and University Entrance are higher than ever. Students are striving for and achieving merit and excellence grades. I acknowledge the hard work of teachers, families and the students themselves in bringing about these successes. The Mount Roskill Community can be very proud of its young people.

To continue to enhance the quality of education offered we are further developing professional learning opportunities for our teachers. The aim is to ensure that our students become confident connected life-long learners who achieve outstanding academic success. Each teacher is working in a learning project that will enhance the achievement of our students. The teachers meet early on Wednesday mornings and the school day begins at 9.15am. This is part of the MERGE project which is outlined later in the newsletter. On **Monday 16 March there will be a teacher only day** for all of the teachers of the Roskill Campus. 






Top 20 students scoring Excellence Grades in 2008:










MERGE: MAXIMISING ENGAGEMENT OF THE ROSKILL GROUP'S EDUCATION

A new and exciting opportunity has arisen for the teachers from Mt Roskill Grammar, Intermediate and Primary to work together to improve teaching and learning across the campus. Teachers will be devising new, exciting and more effective ways to implement the new NZ Curriculum and lift the achievement of students from when they start school at five years old, through to their senior secondary qualification years. The new curriculum requires schools to equip students for the real challenges of the 21st century through initiatives to encourage them to become **confident, connected, actively involved life-long learners.**

In order to do this, teachers from all three schools will meet together to reflect on their teaching, data from tests and surveys and read up-to-date research. Doing this will assist teachers to creatively design and trial new strategies in their classrooms that will enable students to become better learners.

At Mt. Roskill Grammar School this year, teachers will meet each Wednesday before school begins, in "Professional Learning Circles" or PLCs. During this time, teachers will participate in a group that concentrates on a topic of interest and also a group within their own departments. These PLCs will operate using the "Teacher Inquiry Model" (shown to the right):





The "rocket" diagram (left) shows how the PLCs, with their various topics are intended to produce better teaching and learning within the school. It also shows how data and research assist the teachers to implement the curriculum and advance the goals of the school's strategic plan. The topics that teachers will be working on this year are listed below:

- Raising Pasifika Achievement
- Literacy
- Differentiated Learning for High Achievers
- Engaging Low Achieving Students
- E-learning
- Raising Maori Achievement
- Restorative Justice
- Sub-Merge (cross campus focus on literacy)
- TESSOL (for students who speak other languages)

Through this initiative, we hope to be able to make learning more relevant to all of our students and make the transition through their education, both within school and beyond, easier and more seamless. We believe that our school campus is a community of learners. By encouraging and fostering learning as inquiry, all of our learning community including teachers, students and families will be empowered to work together to the benefit of our whole society. This is because societies will always function best when its members are **confident**, **connected actively involved life-long learners**.

REALISE THE DREAM

In early December last year, three Mount Roskill Grammar students were part of a group of 29 other students from across New Zealand who attended the prestigious Genesis Energy 'Realise the Dream' event in Wellington.

The Genesis Energy 'Realise the Dream' event celebrated the work of students who have carried out excellent science or technological practice. The students were chosen through nomination from regional science and technology fairs across the country to present their projects to a panel of judges, as well as attending workshops and activities in the week-long event.

Alwin Lim (13RHRA) investigated the maximum air temperature for frost to form, after noting frost formation with the air temperature above freezing, thus his project titled 'There's frost on my car but it's

not freezing cold'. Joseph Windsor (11MROB) wanted to know how exercise affected classroom concentration. He used a number of concentration tests on a group of friends as a

control group to investigate his problem, calling it 'Boys on Bikes'. Abhilash Kamineni (13BFTZ) was a prize winner in the Bright Sparks Competition with his touch screen clock and tic-tac-toe robot. At the event, he was awarded an allexpenses paid for trip to Taiwan to attend the Taiwan International Science Fair, where he was awarded 2nd prize (1st prize went to another NZ student). Congratulations Abhilash.

"The event was very full-on, but it was an awesome experience in an invaluable environment. We all had the opportunity to share our work with others who have similar interests as well as enjoying and learning from the exciting activities planned for us through the week. And on top of all that, we all made a new bunch of friends."

Organised by the Royal Society of New Zealand, students visited science institutions around Wellington such as GNS Science, Island Bay Marine Centre, Massey University Wellington and the Karori Wildlife Sanctuary. The Genesis Energy 'Realise the Dream' is also sponsored by DairyNZ and the New Zealand Commission for UNESCO. The students return to Wellington on March 9 for the awards dinner, where cash prizes of up to \$7,000 and international travel to countries such as China and the United Kingdom will be presented.

Doing science and technology projects are a great form of hands-on learning where the skills and information picked up often cannot be taught by a teacher in a classroom. Students are encouraged to get involved and attend science fair meetings to find out more and for help to get started. PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Physical Education is a compulsory subject at Mt Roskill Grammar from year 9 – 12 where all students have two periods per week. All students are expected to wear correct PE uniform for all lessons. Please ensure your son/daughter has their uniform clearly named in full.

We all know the benefits of exercise and eating properly, we have read it, most of us have acted on it, yet we still get many parents signing letters to get their child excused from PE. Please think about what you are doing before signing – there are many things in life we do not feel like doing but most often, once we have done them we are glad we did.

If your child is well enough to be at school then they can still take part in some of the PE lesson. The Physical Education curriculum area is often referred to as having the most valuable skills you can learn for life – by learning; teamwork, sportsmanship, peer friendships, cooperation, leadership, self esteem, self confidence, personal identity and self worth and even though students maybe fully involved in sport outside of school they can still benefit in these areas during PE.

Interpersonal skills: Respect for diversity and cultures, care and concern for others, social justice, communication skills, tolerance. These are some of qualities we want to install in our students as well as being physically active.

Most of these benefits are not measurable but clearly lead to a more production and healthy life style.

As parents we hope you can help us to help you build these skills in your child while they attend Mt Roskill Grammar so please next time your son/daughter asks for a note to be excused from Physical Education you may think twice Physical Education is no different to any other subject – you wouldn't think of asking your child to be excused from Maths or English, why PE?
