Last week I was fortunate enough to attend the New Zealand Top Scholars ceremony at Parliament Buildings. It was a real pleasure to see Timothy Vogel receive his Premier Scholars medal from the Governor General and for Jessie Xing to be recognised for coming top in New Zealand in a subject. Earlier this week the Honourable Phil Goff MP for Mt Roskill and Leader of the Opposition presented awards to all of our students who gained an excellence endorsement in NCEA last year. This requires the accumulation of at least 50 credits at that level something that only 3 or 4% of candidates nationwide accomplish. Excellence criteria are demanding and the students were recognised for consistently demonstrating higher level skills including advanced critical thinking with the ability to integrate, and synthesise, while also applying knowledge, skills, understanding and ideas. The list of students gaining the gold excellence badge and those receiving the silver merit badge will be included in the next newsletter.



Our Internal Exams for the senior school start this Friday. These early controlled assessments are an excellent opportunity for students to gauge their preparedness to sit final examinations later in the year. There is much advice that can be given about exam preparation and at a recent assembly shared with students the following 'first steps to success':

- Know when your exams are. Build a study programme around this.
- Be clear about what you need to learn. (Which standard is being assessed?) Know exactly what you need to do to show success. (What are the criteria?)
- In achievement standards we expect you to be attempting to achieve at merit and excellence. In NCEA it's not only about how many credits can be gained but about the quality of the credits gained. Make sure you know exactly what it takes to get Merit and Excellence grades. Think about what makes the difference between getting an Achieved grade or a Merit grade. If you can explain what it takes you are much more likely to be able to do it.

On June 25 along with many Auckland schools we are holding a teacher only day for curriculum development. This is a government mandated teacher release day. Our teachers will be continuing their work towards the 2010 implementation of the revised New Zealand Curriculum.

Our senior girls' water polo team completed an excellent season last week by winning the final of the Auckland Championship B Grade Competition in extra time against St Kentigern College. The support the team receives from families and friends is wonderful and makes a huge difference to the team. As the winter season builds momentum we hope that you will find time to support your sons and daughters from the sideline.

EXCELLENCE AWARDS

Over 150 students who sat the 2008 NCEA assessments are eligible to receive gold Certificates for Scholarship. These will be given out by the Leader of the Opposition, the Honourable Phil Goff at a ceremony on Wednesday 20 May to be held in the Dowdle Library.

To receive an excellence endorsement at any level a student must achieve at least 50 excellence credits in the standards they attempt.

We are very proud of our top scholars and it is exciting to see the number of students who achieve excellent and merit endorsements for their certificates. Nationally 2.6% of students at Level 3 receive excellence endorsements whereas 4.9% of Mount Roskill students qualify. The figures for Level 2 and Level 1 are similar.

In the next few weeks, five chamber groups will be performing at the Hillsborough Heights retirement village (5 June) then competing in the Regionals of the Chamber Competitions All chamber groups will attend a rehearsal on Tuesday 2 June between 1 - 4 pm to prepare for this.

Our busy term in music continues with a Pacifica Beats band being mentored by Mr Tama Waipara through NZ Music Commission funding as they prepare for their competition. The Jazz Combo is building its repertoire aiming to compete in the Jazz Competitions, while the Rockquest bands are also underway.

We are fortunate to have among our new Itinerant tutor staffing some busy working musicians who play in bands such as the Rodger Fox big band:- Mr Scholes – trumpet tutor, who takes the stage band and Mr Atkinson – saxophone tutor who takes the Concert Band.

A few singer-songwriter students are submitting songs to the Play it Strange Songwriting competition and one student, Oliver Xu has entered an orchestral composition in the 2009 NZSO Young Composer Award.



Our orchestra and Concert Band are on track to compete in the KBB festival. Our Junior Concert Band (pictured), - (a beginner band of 25 students) is well underway being ably led by Miss Steedman. They are looking forward to their first performance later in the term.

The Boys' Choir is being taken this year by the renowned Mr Terence Maskell who conducts the internationally known Graduate choir, and we will start a Girls' Choir in the second half of this term.

WORLD VISION 40 HOUR FAMINE

This year fundraising for World Vision has kicked off with a blast. The theme is malnutrition and we are raising money to target the issue in developing countries; especially for children living in Bangladesh, India and Tanzania. Our 40 hour famine leaders have set a target of \$20,000 which we hope to raise through several events as well



as through individual student efforts by getting sponsors. Term I was successful with "Dancing with the Staff" happening where we raised well over \$1,000. Two of our top music students, Eric and David, also busked on Queen Street to raise further money. Apart from bake sales and sausage sizzles, we hope to bring in local artists to perform and hope this Term will be just as successful as the last. Thank you to all the students who are taking part in their own famines to raise money. The official weekend is 22-25 May and money is due in June. Until then keep up the good work supporting this worthy cause and let's raise the stakes.

NZQA EXAMINATION FEES:

These fees are now overdue and should be paid as soon as possible to the Accounts Office.

Fees are \$75 for New Zealand resident students and \$375 for non-resident students. The fees are set by the Qualifications Authority and collected by the School on the Authority's behalf. The fee for NZ residents covers all Achievement and Unit standards assessed both internally and externally and also covers entry into 3 Scholarship subjects. Non-resident students should check with Mrs Harding if they wish to enter Scholarship. There is financial assistance available for those families who are on a benefit or qualify for a Community Services Card. Forms for Financial Assistance are available from Mrs Wills in the Administration Office.

SURF LIFESAVING

During term 4 of last year and 1 of this year, the new MRGS Surf Lifesaving team in partnership with the United Northern Piha Surf Lifesaving Club met and began training towards the Surf Lifesaving New Zealand Surf Lifeguard Award, the first qualification needed to work professionally as a lifeguard here in NZ and overseas. The team was very committed and trained 2 week nights a week for swim training and first aid theory. This was followed with all day sessions on Sundays, hitting the surf at Piha.

The lifeguard exams were finally run in March and by this time the tough schedule meant that only 4 of the original 12 members of the group were ready to try for their exams; **Briar Elliston**, **Holly Elliston**, **Catie Mulrennan** and **Kathryn Frankcom-Burgess**. The girls met for 'Lifeguard Finishing School' at Muriwai on 28 March. In challenging 3 to 4 ft surf with strong rips running and numerous surfers in the line up the girls ran through a number of surf skills, practice rescues and scenarios. By the end of the day they were tired and aware that the real exam at Piha the following weekend would be very challenging.

On Saturday 4 April the girls met the rest of the candidates from Surf Lifesaving Northern Region for the real exam at North Piha and once again the west coast served up very testing conditions. The majority of the exam was run in an area with a particularly powerful rip that the girls had to work against to successfully complete the exercises, practicing skills that will serve them well in their future lifeguarding. To their great credit they all completed the day successfully and achieved the Surf Lifeguard award. A special prizegiving was held on Saturday 16 May at the Marine Rescue Centre in the city, where the girls received their certification. They deserve great credit for their dedication and commitment. Congratulations girls!

The group will meet again in Term 4 and new members are very welcome. To qualify you must be reasonably fit, and with training over the two terms and summer able to complete a 400 metre timed swim in less than 9 minutes without stopping. You will also need to be able to commit twice a week to training, including Sundays through the summer to hang out at Piha and work on your skills.

YEAR 12 HISTORY TRIP

For 3 days from Wednesday March 25th to 27th, 20 students and 2 teachers went to the

central North Island to learn about the impact of war on the New Zealand Identity, which meant visiting the Kippenberger Museum at Waiouru. STUDENTS LEAVING SCHOOL DURING THE DAY
