

MRGS FUNDRAISING LAUNCH FOR THE HOCKEY TURF AND SPORTS PAVILION

The fundraising project for the Hockey Turf Redevelopment and the Sports Pavilion was launched as part The MRGS Diamond Jubilee on Saturday 17th August. The Hockey Turf Redevelopment is a \$1.5 million dollar project to upgrade the turf into a water based turf. Many of you will know that the current turf has undulating surfaces.



The Hockey turf and sports pavilion development is in line with

the MRGS strategic plan for 2013-2018 which says that MRGS will develop and promote centres of excellence and develop facilities to promote quality educational experiences

The Hockey Turf project development subcommittee consists of Auckland Hockey Association, Roskill Eden and Mt Eden Hockey Clubs and MRGS. This group has already been very successful in obtaining \$400,000 from the Auckland Council Central Facility Partnership Committee.

This very generous grant was handed over by Shale Chambers - Chairperson Auckland Council Central Facility Partnership Committee to the MRGS Girls Hockey $\mathbf{1}^{st}$ 11. Thank you Auckland Council for this grant.

At the launch the new fundraising display board complete with its thermometer was on show as was the banner which gives an artist's view of the proposed Hockey turf and sports pavilion. Go along to the Hockey Turf and check it out.

Where to from here? You are all welcome to get involved in fundraising.

We now have \$1.1 million to raise for the turf. MRGS also has plans to build a sports pavilion which will be located between the Hockey turf and the Rugby fields so we have lots of fundraising to do. The MRGS fundraising committee had its first meeting on the 22nd August at the school. The Jubilee event took place on Saturday 17th August and was a successful celebration of the school's first 60 years. Over 350 people attended the morning's events and there was plenty of opportunity for seeing the school and catching up with old friends.

Registered past pupils were arriving from 9.20 for the 10.00 first event and by 9.55 a large crowd gathered in the front left corner of the main field to honour the memory of Bob Laing and his service to the school. Mr Steve Cole – ex teacher of the school and present Headmaster of St Kentigern College spoke warmly of his encounters with Mr Laing and our 1st XV sang and performed a haka as the monumental plaque was unveiled. After this the returning visitors moved towards the hall car park where a powhiri welcomed them with speeches from Mr Watson,

Mr Tuialii and student Luke Edmonds. These Whaikorero were answered by a past head boy of the school and other speakers before the crowd moved into the hall for morning tea. Other events of the morning

were the unveiling of the plaque for the Jubilee Avenue of Pohutakawa trees -

when Mr Colin Prentice shared a few of his school memories. Also the morning saw the launch of the Turf replacement fundraising project.

Visitors ended their morning and early afternoon with tours around the classrooms to view memorabilia and subject displays before taking the opportunity to be photographed in their decade groups.



In the evening there was a very well-received dinner at Alexandra Park – over 120 people attended this. Our talented student Jazz combo played as the diners assembled and after welcoming speeches they were entertained by the 'Remarkables" a student group formed by the four Ilauaa brothers. During the dinner Khylee Quince – Sursum Trust committee member and ex Deputy Head Prefect of the school – captured the attention of the diners with her recollections of student life at Roskill and a little later Colin



Prentice gave the listeners an interesting and entertaining account of his memories as both a student and principal. The evening was a memorable end to the celebrations and as individuals left they commented on the great day of events and their re-acquaintance with people and places.

INTERNATIONAL CHEMISTRY OLYMPIAD SUCCESS



Cindy Ou Y13 has achieved international success by winning a bronze medal in the 45th annual Chemistry Olympiad. The event took place over the recent holiday break and Cindy was a member of a strong New Zealand Team which as a group was awarded the bronze medal status. The Olympiad, held this year in Moscow, brought together secondary and high school student teams from all over the world to exhibit their expertise in Chemistry.

Cindy gained her place in the national team after taking part in selection rounds and finally a training group here in New Zealand where the final team of three were chosen from over 30 of our country's top Chemistry scholars. The selection is based upon performance in a selection tests and assumes knowledge of only Year 12 (NCEA Level 2) Chemistry.

Cindy joins a long list of MRGS national team members and medal winners in this prestigious competition. In seven of the last ten years Roskill students have gained places in the New Zealand Chemistry Olympiad team.

AUSTRALASIAN COMPUTING EXAMINATION—HIGH DISTINCTION ACHIEVEMENT

Two MRGS students performed at the highest level in the recent Australasian Computing Examination. Jonathan Khoo, Year 10, gained a High Distinction with 40/45 and achieving in the Top 1% of New Zealand and the Pacific Region. Nathan McDougall, Year 11 gained a Distinction with 36/45 and achieving in the Top 5% in New Zealand and the Pacific Region.



MOUNT ROSKILL WINS THE INAUGURAL NZ ASSOCIATION OF LANGUAGE TEACHERS TROPHY

The school was recently awarded the NZALT trophy for the top school in NZ in the Language Perfect World Championships. Last year more than 100,000 students across the world competed in the cyberbattle to become the world champion of languages, and this year that figure reached over 200,000. This year, for the first time, students in New Zealand were competing for the chance to win the NZALT / Language Perfect Top School in New Zealand Trophy. Mt. Roskill students answered 1.3 million questions correctly during the 10 days of the competition, with over 200 students involved, and as a result were the



winners of the trophy. The trophy was presented to the school at an assembly by Martin East NZALT president who in congratulation said; "This is an excellent achievement for Mt. Roskill, and an excellent celebration both of the value and importance of language learning in today's world and of Mt. Roskill students' levels of knowledge and expertise in languages other than English."



STORYLINES FESTIVAL PERFORMANCE AT AOTEA CENTRE BY PERFORMING ARTS STUDENTS

On Sunday the 18th of August, thirteen Year 12 and 13 students performed a devised drama at the annual Storylines Festival at the Aotea Centre. The free family-friendly event attracts thousands of people from all over Auckland to meet their favourite children's authors and participate in activities

that promote reading for families.



The students performed their piece, *The House that Jack Built* (inspired by Gavin Bishop's book) twice in the space of an hour for large crowds. In the style of physical theatre, the piece

aimed to show the development of the relationship between Maori and Pakeha since the colonial period. The author

watched our performance and gave a talk afterwards, expressing that he had seen many professional performances of his book, but that "this was the most intelligent interpretation he had seen." The Performing Arts Department are proud of the hard work the students put into this performance and would like to congratulate them on their professional performance ethic at the festival.

SPORTS UPDATE

Term 3 has been exciting as well as busy for the Sports Department with most winter sports finishing their competitions well. There have been highlights in many sports this season. Well done to everyone for participating to a high standard and upholding an excellent level of sportsmanship and fair play during their games.

BASKETBALL

The highlight in Boys Basketball this season was the Under 17 A team who finished their season in 3rd position in the Central competition. Superbly coached by Mr Buckley, the team went through the regular season unbeaten with outstanding performances by Teiko Fonua in particular. In the finals competition they suffered a couple of close losses to Marcellin and One Tree Hill.

FOOTBALL

The 1st XI Girls team had their best season in many years playing in the Central Senior A Under 19 competition. They went through the regular season with 6 wins from 9 games and scoring a whopping 31 goals. In the finals series they beat Kelston Girls in the quarter finals and narrowly lost their semi final to Epsom Girls, despite playing their best game of the season. The girls have been coached by Mr Morris and Mr Cluely, both giving up their own time to come in and share their expertise with the team.

The 2nd XI Girls and 3rd XI Girls teams played in the same grade this year and both had great seasons. The 2nd XI Girls coached by Miss Thomas, finished in 2nd position and only conceded 3 goals all season. The 3rd XI Girls team coached by Hayden Couper, a Year 12 student, had a great start to the season however they eventually lost a couple of close matches to finish 6th.

The Junior Boys team had a positive season in the 13B Central grade. They played the majority of the year against strong Football schools such as MAGS and AGS and competed well. They



only lost 2 games throughout the whole season and many of these boys will be pushing for places in the Football Academy next year. The team was coached by two student coaches, Ravindra Prasad and Sunil Penumarthy and staff member Mr Green.

LACROSSE

We started our first Girls Lacrosse team this year who were coached by Ms Leman and Year 13 student Vaughan Thompson. The team played in the second division and came 8th overall. They also entered the Auckland Secondary School one day competition and came 8th as well. The stand out performer for the team was Kaaj Pala who picked the game up this year and is a natural goal scorer.



HOCKEY

Undoubtedly the top performance this year from our Hockey teams has come from the Under 15 Girls. Once again they have gone through the season in the top grade for their age group and shown that Mount Roskill Grammar teams can compete with the best and win. Needing a win against Diocesan they could only manage a 0-0 draw which meant that they finished second, the same result as last year. They went through the season with no losses and only conceded 6 goals, the lowest in the competition. The team was coached by Barry Bryan.



RUGBY

There were two highlights this year in Rugby, the 1st XV making the Championship grade and coming within a whisker of making the semi finals. The second outstanding achievement came from the Girls 10 -a-side team who only lost 2 games all season. Toru Arakura was a revelation for the team, scoring at least two tries per game and leading the team well from the First Five position.

The 1st XV came within one point of making the semi finals of the 1B competition and lived to rue a couple of games early in the season that cost them much needed points later on. Coached by Mr Overton, Mr McGibbon and Mr Stephenson and with Mr Hall as manager the team were well supported on and off the field. They now have a great launching pad for an assault on the competition next year and hopefully going at least one step further.

RUGBY LEAGUE



It is fair to say the team started the season slowly, losing many games by close margins to teams that they should have beaten. The coach, Mr Taunga was frequently seen pulling his hair out with frustration, however, the team finally started showing their promise and qualified in the Bowl section. They played some excellent Rugby League and managed to come from 4th position to make the final. The final was played at Mt Smart No. 2 and the team trailed 0-14 early in the second half.

Suddenly the team burst into life scoring three quick tries, however they could not convert any of them, meaning they lost 12-14 to James Cook. Congratulations to the team for persevering through a string of losses to make the best of their final few games and nearly steal the Bowl. Thank you to Mr Taunga and Ms Tokley for their coaching and management of the team.

BADMINTON

This year we had over 20 teams competing in the Auckland competition during Term 2. The organisation of all teams is handled superbly by Mr Dix who also spends several nights at Auckland Badminton looking after teams. The Tuesday and Wednesday Girls teams won their competitions and the A Team who play on Friday nights have done enough to get themselves back in the top level of Auckland competition next year.



Craft activities:

- Raranga flax weaving Practise your weaving skills under the leadership of master weaver Marafetu Smith
- Floral Design with an Eastern influence Learn about some of the meanings inherent in Eastern floral design and create your own simple floral work.
- **Tivavae Quilting (Cook Island patchwork)** Ever wanted to make your own tivavae? Kaututu Mataora will show tou know to cut a paper pattern and start making your own tivaevae cushion.
- **Tongan Tapa** Vaioletti Taupeaafe heads the well-known Tapa group, Langafononua, who will demonstrate how easy it is to make your own pattern (kupesi) to decorate your tapa (ngatu).
- **Heena-** Also know as Mehandi ("staining onself"), this is a decorative and symbolic form of art from India. In this workshop, learn how to apply Heena with simple patterns.
- Rangouli Is a form of bright, decorative folk art from India typically made in living rooms and courtyard floors during Hindu festivals. This is to create a sacred, welcoming area for the Hindu deities, using ancient symbols. The patterns are usually made with coloured rice, dry flour, coloured sand or even flower petals. In this workshop, learn to make some simple patterns with coloured powder.
- Cook Island Crochet Flowers Using embroidery cotton and florist wire, make a flower to wear in your hair with Koraura Smith from the Cook Islands.
- **Domestic crafts** Marlyne Jackson is a practicing artist and will create a playful work to share with you incorporating everyday domestic craft items.


