MRGS Board of Trustees – BoT Election Update

Kia ora MRGS whānau

This article is about the upcoming trustee elections. The slogan for these elections is

"STEP FORWARD FOR YOUR SCHOOL"

Step forward and think about if you want to be a trustee and step forward and vote for trustees. Trustees are active leaders in our schools. They have an important role of supporting strong professional leadership and ensuring effective teaching for all students through informed governance.

Nominations for the MRGS BoT close on **Friday 7th June**. If you are thinking about becoming a trustee then please contact BoT Chairperson, Marjet Pot or any of the BoT members on the website to find out what is involved in being a Trustee.

The BoT should have a range of skills and people who are committed to work together as a team. These skills could include but not limited to people skills, financial, engineering, leadership or marketing skills. We also need Trustees who represent their community and want to be part of the team which raises educational outcomes for students. Training is provided on what is required of a Trustee to help those people who are new to the role. Parents/caregivers and people in the wider community can be school trustees. We want the MRGS Board to represent the diversity of our school community.

At the MRGS Trustee elections, 5 people are elected onto the BoT which leaves the opportunity to co-opt a further 4 people. This co-option process aims to ensure we have the right skills and cultural diversity around the table to make the decisions required to govern the school. The Principal is a member of the BoT and combined with the staff trustee they bring the educational expertise to the BoT discussions. The student trustee brings a student perspective to the discussions.

People often ask me what the BoT does and so here is a list below of some responsibilities.

- Working with the principal and consult with staff, students and the community
- Setting the educational goals and strategic direction of the school
- Monitoring progress and inform parents on how the school is progressing against its annual targets and on the development of the students
- Deciding how the school's funding will be spent
- Support the development of all staff
- Ensuring the school is a physically and emotionally safe place for all students and staff, and is inclusive of and caters for students with differing needs
- Overseeing the management of staff, property, finances, curriculum and administration.

Being a Trustee requires time as there are many meetings and public events which require Trustee presence.

The Trustee elections are the opportunity to vote for candidates who will make a positive difference for your children's education. On **Thursday 13th June at 7.30pm** in the Hodge Learning Commons there is a meet the candidates evening. This is a public meeting so come along and meet the candidates and hear how they will represent the school community.

It is equally as important that you take the time to vote. Your vote counts.

It is preferable that you post your election papers early as the post is often quite unreliable, or drop them off at the school yourself. Best not to give them to your child to bring to school.

Nominations and votes must be on site at the office by the deadline, not posted/post dated.

The voting closes on **Friday 21st June**. Please take the time to vote and get your voting papers back to school before the deadline.

Peer Mediation Training: "Students Helping Students"


Over the last few months, (March- May) 115 new Mediators have been trained by the Peace Foundation learning the important skills of how to resolve everyday conflict in a constructive way. These life skills of open communication, relationship building and 'listening to understand' are part of MRGS's culture and values of manaakitanga and whanaungtanga respect, kindness, understanding diversity and aroha for everyone.

60 Advanced Mediators attended further mediation training from Human Rights activist Julie Watson on "Developing positive Race Relations"; SHINE on the effects of violence and how to be an active bystander; Rainbow Youth on embracing sexual and gender diversity; and the Peace Foundation along with LEADR Lawyer Mediators on advanced mediation skills.

Student voice: "I really loved hearing how everyone used mediation in their day to day lives and jobs, and it made me realise how useful mediation is".

"A lot of conflict arises amongst teens and I can see myself using these skills when I'm with my friends in normal day to day conversation"

"Mediation can help resolve conflict without violence".

Consent Awareness Week

Week 5 was Mount Roskill Grammar School's fourth "Consent Awareness Week" run by the Peer Sexuality Support Programme team.

During this week, we raise awareness about the New Zealand law and sexual consent. Consent is needed before you can have sexual contact with someone else. Consent is a free agreement between people, and cannot be coerced, pressured and forced.



Consent can be withdrawn at any time.

To be able to give consent, you need to be 16 and over and clear minded (not drunk or under the influence of drugs).

It is the older person's responsibility to ensure the person they are with is 16 or older. This law exists to protect young people from being exploited by older people.
