MRGS is a community that supports students in building resilience, buffering them from the effects of Covid 19. Every event, every group that connects people is important. We haven't been able to run everything as expected. However our sports teams, cultural, performance, and student led groups have excelled in organising events and enabling others to participate when possible. It has been fantastic to see so many families out supporting teams, and feeling the strength of our community.

Focusing on what students and families can control is important in beating the impact of Covid too. ### Young Enterprise: BP Business Challenge

At the start of August Young Enterprise hosted a three-day business challenge at MRGS. 70 Year 10 students were enrolled and worked with two external consultants. The BP Business Challenge is a unique three-day experiential learning programme that develops skills, understandings and attitudes about how a successful business operates and connects the students with their local business community. On the final day five external judges, gave students feedback on their work.

At the end of an intense three days the results were:

- Power Rango won the challenge with a brilliant idea of Solar Powered Power Bank to charge our
  devices when we are not around a power source for long periods of time, for example on a hike.
- Two other ideas which were highly appreciated a **Drone Referee** for sports games to pick on all small and big errors and a **Diversity Phone App** which teaches the young generation about practices and norms of different cultures.

The plan is to take these teams along with other students who are interested to national innovation championships next year to compete with thousands of teams around the country. A huge thank you to Mr Chopra for his organisation and energy and to the Commerce Department for their support.



## College Sport Individual Swimming Championships


