# Learning Hub Opening







Three or four generations ago it would have been quite normal for Māori to live surrounded by visual expressions of their whakapapa, histories and pūrākau. The Hub project provided us with an opportunity to honour this visual storytelling within an important space in our kura.

Inside you'll see one of the two designs is based on the Poutama, a stepped pattern that can be used to represent the learning journey, intellectual achievement and a chiefly wisdom.


In the Hub the Poutama based design represents our learning journeys as tauira and kaiako. Along the edge of the Poutama is a repeated kōwhiti motif that references tukutuku and represents the paths our ancestors took before us and that idea that they lay a path for us and support us on our own journeys.

The second design is based on the niho taniwha pattern which is often seen in tāniko and tukutuku. Niho taniwha or 'taniwha teeth' can be used to represent family houses or hapū within iwi, and the pūrākau, whakapapa and histories that are passed down through the generations. In the Hub the niho taniwha based design represents the different groups within our Kura that work together towards common goals. It also represents the many ways in which information and knowledge is communicated and passed down and the way that we can receive and contribute to knowledge before passing it on to others.

These important features of the Hub space create new opportunities for us to share and honour the practice of visual storytelling within te ao Māori which will be woven into our year 9 induction programme and other courses within our school curriculum so tauira understand their meaning and significance

### Attendance

We know the best place for students to learn is here with us at school. Alongside the Ministry of Education expectation, we also aspire to students being with us 90% or more of the time. Please support your child to be here every day. Every minute of learning counts.

You will receive a fortnightly update of your child's attendance via email, please discuss this with your child so they are aware of their attendance levels regularly.

### Phone Use in Lessons

We are working hard to build and maintain the most effective learning environments for our students. It has been identified both at MRGS and internationally in schools that phones are creating a lot of distraction from engagement and learning, and therefore hindering progress.

We have reinforced with students in School Assemblies and classes our school policy that phones are not to be used in class unless directed by the teacher. Students will be asked to have their phones away in their bags, on silent during lessons. Please support us by discussing this at home with your child and reinforcing a focus on learning.

### Mentoring 1

Our first round of senior mentoring will take place on **Wednesday 29 March**. On that day we will be open for instruction until 1:25pm from then on the junior students will head home. You will receive an email communication about this during this week. Our expectation is that all senior students will meet with their mentors in person here at school, and our hope is that you will join them. The discussions will focus on the progress that has been made towards their goals, academic progress, and planning for the future.

### Chromebooks

MRGS is an established BYOD school, meaning that your child needs to have a device to support their learning in the classroom. The ideal device for learning is lightweight with a keyboard. MRGS' teachers use the Google Classroom platform for all their classes as a way of distributing information, assigning classwork and homework tasks, and giving feedback on assessments.

Through our ICT partners New Era, we give our community access to a purchasing portal called Acquire <u>https://newera-byod.acquire.co.nz/</u>. New Era seeks to provide our community with the most competitive pricing for any new device purchases, but if you are struggling to provide a device for learning and you have a community services card, we do have a limited number of Chromebooks available for loan for the 2023 academic year. To access these devices, a \$50 deposit will need to be paid; you or your child will need to present a community services card at the time that you or they make the deposit.

# Students Driving to School


Students who are driving to school are reminded of the following expectations:






































# Polyfest: Tongan Cultural Group


#### **Careers Update**

#### Transport

The next scheduled work as part of the Mt Roskill's Safer Communities is raising the pedestrian crossing on Mt Albert Road near the Three Kings Plaza

#### Proposed date of works:

- The main construction works commenced on 22 February 2023 and will be for approximately 5 weeks
- Day works will run from **7am to 7pm**
- Night works will from **8pm to 5am**

Please note that these dates may change due to unforeseen circumstances or changing weather conditions. The line marking, pavement, asphalt and signal works may be undertaken during the night.



#### Auckland Transport has been working alongside community representatives including those from local businesses, nearby schools, and the Puketāpapa Local Board to make improvements in your neighbourhood.

This project is helping us to achieve our goal to reduce death and serious injury on our roads and AT consulted on this work in 2021. Our safety improvements at the intersection of Frost Road and Mt Albert Road are now complete and the changes have made it safer for all road users.

AT will no longer be working on the intersection of Hayr Road, Dornwell Road and Mt Albert Road. AT will only be raising the zebra crossing along Mt Albert Road to make it safer for pedestrians to cross the road and we will also put in two community requested speed humps along Hayr Road.
