From the Principal

Kia ora koutou

The Level 3 Drama production of 'Puffs' by Matt Cox was a joyous and complicated show with over 60 characters, dozens of costumes created in our Theatre Technology classes and hundreds of lighting and sound effects. The play is a parody of the Harry Potter book and movies series from the perspective of the 'Puffs'. Congratulations to everyone who contributed to a show filled with energy and humour. Thank you to Ms Gillies and her team for courageously and successfully taking on such a mammoth production.

I wanted to touch on a message that was shared with our students this week through our assemblies. It feels that every day we are seeing more stories of young people throughout the country acting irresponsibly or antisocially. While we understand that often this is a response to pressures being felt within communities, which we see manifested in how young people approach the world, we do not need to accept this in our school.

In assemblies we talk about the support that is available to our students if they are struggling for any reason. This week we talked about how we all have choices as to how we respond, and that violence does not fix problems but instead just leads to more anger and grievance. For this reason, we reinforced that we do not tolerate such behaviours in our school. I reminded our students that they have many people who care about them and can help them work through issues, including teachers, counsellors, deans, student mediators and their own family members.

My final message was that each one of us – staff and students alike – play a part in producing a comfortable, purposeful school where great learning is our thing.

This message was underlined by some wonderful role models who took to the stage this week – our concert band, and two of our prefects who spoke about our Peer Sexuality Support Programme and introduced new student leaders.

Uniform

Attendance

This graph is showing us the direct correlation between high attendance, and likelihood of achieving Level 1 by the end of year 11. The more students are here, at school, in their lessons and engaged in their learning the more likely they are to make progress and achieve. You can see from the graph, that in order to gain the current Level 1 requirement of at least 80 credits to achieve Level 1 NCEA, students need to be at school 90% or more of the time.

Please support us, and ensure your child is at school every day.





Figure 1: Probability of Year 11 students in 2016 attaining NCEA level 1, by attendance in Term 2

Phone Use in Lessons

At the start of this year, we reminded students about our expectations of phone use in lessons. Our school policy states that phones are not to be used or seen during lessons, unless directed by the teacher for learning purposes. We have had a positive response from the majority of students in regard to keeping their phones in their bags during lessons so far.

NCEA Information evening

Chromebooks

MRGS is an established BYOD school, meaning that your child is recommended to have a device to support their learning in the classroom. The ideal device for learning is lightweight with a keyboard. MRGS teachers use the Google Classroom platform for all their classes as a way of distributing information, assigning classwork and homework tasks, and giving feedback on assessments.

Through our ICT partners New Era, we give our community access to a purchasing portal called Acquire https://newera-byod.acquire.co.nz/. New Era seeks to provide our community with the most competitive pricing for any new device purchases, but if you are struggling to provide a device for learning and you have a community services card, we do have a limited number of Chromebooks available for loan for the 2023 academic year. To access these devices, a \$50 deposit will need to be paid; you or your child will need to present a community services card at the time that you or they make the deposit.

School Ball 2023

Our annual school ball is rapidly approaching. This year it is to be held at the Ellerslie Event Centre on Saturday the 24th of June. The cost is \$125.

It is school policy that students need to pay off any outstanding school fees before they can purchase a ticket to the school ball. This includes camp. If you are unsure about any outstanding fees you can get a printout of these from the accounts department.

We will be accepting an initial deposit of \$50 but the full amount needs to be paid by the end of school on Friday the 16th of June as this is when final numbers are sent to the venue and caterers.

If you wish to take an outside partner you will need to collect a form from accounts and get it filled out and then approved by Mr Skiff before you can purchase the tickets.

Meditation Training

Tuesday and Wednesday saw close to 100 of our senior students training to be Peer Mediators within our school. The Peace Foundation came in with two very experienced mediators to work with the first group on Tuesday to run their Learning through Peer Mediation Programme. This was an experiential day with our rangitahi learning through experiencing mediation both as the mediators and the disputent. These are valuable skills for the students to help them resolve conflict within our school, and are also life skills which the students can use with their peers and their wider community.

Wednesday saw four Peace Foundation teachers as well as three lawyers/mediators come and work with our students who had already trained as mediators last year to learn advanced mediating skills.

This was a truely awesome day where each group of students got a lot if intensive, devoted training from an experienced mediator. The development of the conflict resolution skills of these students over the day was remarkable.

Thank you to all of these students who were very focussed and involved fully all day. And thank you so very much to The Peace Foundation who continue to support our school to develop skilled wise young citizens.



Now we've got the new Library space open, this term the focus is on developing and getting everyone using the new Library Website. It is now available and hopefully students have been enjoying exploring it and finding it useful.


Using the library website students can manage their library account – checking which books they have out and when they are due back and renewing or reserving books. They can also check to see what new arrivals have come in.

The Library website is also an excellent resource for research and helping write assessments – there are hints and tips for researching and writing bibliographies as well as lots of links to reliable databases and online resources. There are separate webpages (called Dashboards) set up for topics studied in a number of different subjects (Social Sciences, English, Science) with specific resources around that topic to help students with their study.

Students can log in using their Student ID number and usual password to manage their account or the website can be accessed by anyone under the 'Guest' option, so friends and whānau can also explore the site and use the resources available.

Because we want the library to be student led there is also the opportunity to make suggestions on what books or graphic novels students would like to see in our collection.


Mountain Biking Event 2: Hunua Ranges

Learning Hub Book Review





THE ISLAND by C.L. TAYLOR

Six teenage friends head off for a weeklong camping trip on an uninhabited, remote tropical island in Thailand, just them and one survival guide. But even before they head off, there are arguments plaguing the group. They all have secrets they are keeping and trauma they are trying to hide. When their guide suddenly dies after their first night on the Island, and someone has destroyed the engine of their boat, the only way off the Island, things go from bad to ... deadly.


It seems like someone on the Island was listening when they all sat around their campfire that first night revealing their worst fears — and suddenly all those nightmares are coming true. Is someone else on the Island with them...or is it the Island itself?

This is a suspenseful, fast paced book that really leaves you guessing what on earth might be going on. There is a lot of misdirection, and all the characters feel suspicious, like they are hiding things (which they all are!), and this really adds to the tension, suspense and feeling of panic.

This is a very clever book that keeps you guessing right to the end – if you like a good twist ending this book is for you!

Don't forget books are also available for free from Auckland Public libraries – all you need to do is register for a (free) library card and you can access a huge collection. If your local branch doesn't have a copy, they will order one for you into the branch. And don't forget they have a huge online catalogue, including newspapers, magazines, ebooks and audiobooks that you can access on your phone. You just need your library card number. Laura Shepperson (1997)




Her book is a new retelling of an old story. A story of celebrity scandal and gossip, court room drama, and betrayal set in mythological Athens.
