So many students have enjoyed representing the school and our values in a range of events and activities over recent week. Congratulations to our musicians, spoken word team and to our senior boys and girl' basketball teams who have all excelled recently in Auckland competitions. This week we are looking forward to meeting and competing with schools from across New Zealand in the national sports Tournaments.

A big focus for the last three weeks of term are the senior practice exams. Students have their exam timetables. Exams take place during lesson time and senior students attend usual classes in between exam sessions. There are four days during the exam period when longer practical exams are being held and senior students not involved will have a study day at home. This provides a great mix of on-going teaching and some time for students to prepare independently trying out their exam planning and study skills. The practice exams provide a great gauge on learning progress and may also be used to derive a final grade if a student misses an NCEA exam for acceptable reasons. Year 9 and 10 students continue with usual classes throughout and will have their school exams toward the end of term 4.

How To Study

Studying can be a difficult activity. Simply, it consists of knowing what to do and when you're going to do it.

The first part "what to do" is where all those Learning Objectives and practise papers come into play. Through knowing and practising all the things that could come up you will be in an excellent position to succeed. If you don't know what you should know, ask your teachers.

The second part "when you're doing it" can be as simple as using a calendar. The simple idea is to find out when your exam is, backmap to now, and fill in the intervening time with the skills and ideas that you'll need. For example, if I have three weeks before an exam and 12 concepts I need to be comfortable with I will have to cover, on average, four concepts a week. With this in mind I can carve out time on Mon-Thurs for these concepts, allowing time for reflection on Friday.

Chess









The MRGS Chess Team of 2023 are continuing a streak of dominance after impressive performances in both major tournaments we've participated in this year.

First was the Chess Power Central Auckland Clusters, where we competed against Mount Albert Grammar and Lynfield College for a place in the Auckland Regionals. The tournament was a triumph for MRGS, as we finished first place, 1.5 points ahead of a strong MAGS team, with Seven out of the Top Ten individuals being students of MRGS. A special mention to Year 9 Pranav Shenoy whose 6/7 points put him in second place overall.

Next was the Auckland Regional Finals, where Cluster winners from around Auckland fought for Three spots in the National Finals. We sent Ten players, and our MRGS team consisted of Ansh Trivedi, Sourav Dhungel, Pratyush Khatiwada, Mantra Bhatt, Pranav Shenoy, Abraham Chanwong, Dean Saunders, Nathan Carpendale, Jia Ming Tian and Allie O'Callaghan. Throughout the tournament, hosted in our new Learning Hub, our students were in a tight race for 1st place with rivals ACG Sunderland and One Tree Hill College, just losing to One Tree Hill in the final round, finishing in second place by 1.5 points.

This was more than enough to qualify us for the Chess Power National Finals in Auckland later this year, which we hope to win.

Between these two tournaments was the Auckland Girls Chess Championship, where we had three students compete. Maya Ali, Allie O'Callaghan and Shahana Kulathungar. We are proud of these girls for continuing the long-standing tradition of housing strong female chess players.

Phone Use

Our expectation of phones in lessons is:

Phones need to be on silent, in students' bags during lessons, unless directed by the teacher to be used for learning

Teachers will continue to communicate the schools expectations of phones. If phones are seen during lessons, students will be reminded of the expectations and asked to put phones in their bags. If a student is seen with their phone again, students will be asked to hand the phone to the teacher. At the end of the lesson, students will have a brief conversation with the teacher and their phone will be returned to them.

Teachers will record the phone use and confiscation of the phone via kamar. For students who have multiple reports from teachers of phone use, they will first have a conversation with their Dean. The second and subsequent times teachers report a student's phone use in lessons, whānau will be contacted and will be asked to meet with the Deputy Principal of their child's House. In conversation with whānau, students' privilege to have their phone in school will be removed for a certain period of time.

In order to support us with phone use in lessons, and maximise teaching and learning time. We ask for parents to only communicate with their child during break times. If there is an urgent matter, please contact admin and we will communicate with your child as soon as possible. This also enables us to support students with upsetting situations in the best possible way.



Legacy By Whiti Hereaka

Riki is a 15-year-old boy living in Wellington. His Koro and mum are obsessed with history, in particular their family history. His great-great-grandfather was a legendary war hero, one of the members of the 1st Māori Battalion who fought in Gallipoli, France, and Egypt. His Koro took the chance to record his father's memories 43 years earlier, and his mother is writing her thesis on the records. Riki, named after his illustrious, heroic ancestor, is actually rather sick of the whole thing, he has other things (pretty major!) occupying his thoughts lately. But when a distracted Riki steps out in front of a bus, he's about to get to know his great-great-great grandfather well ... VERY well and Riki finds himself in the middle of history with no idea how to get home.

This is such a brilliant and different concept, beautifully executed and engaging. Hereaka has clearly done a lot of research and captures both life in the Māori Battalion and on the beaches of Gallipoli in harrowing detail. As if the carefully thought-out time travelling story line wasn't enough, she has thrown in an intriguing mystery too. Hereaka is a genuine talent with a strong, unique voice and this young adult novel for girls and boys is unputdownable.
