It has been a sad time in school this week as we let students and staff know about the death of one of our students. Eve Gataua (II RSGM), who died on Monday this week. Eve last attended school in 2024 when she was in Year 10.

Eve was diagnosed with cancer late last year. We opened our Learning Hub on Wednesday for students to remember Eve and write cards for the family.

A group of staff and students visited Eve's family to pay our respects and to pass on cards that students had made. Our thoughts and aroha are with Eve's family at this time.

We focused on what peace means to us all in our annual Peace Week this week. Events included lunchtime activities, a can drive, a visit to Ranfurly retirement village and our annual Peace March around the local area. Thank you to our counsellors and mediators for their leadership of these events.

2026 Out of Zone Enrolment for New Students

The closing date for new out-of-zone enrolments for next year is in three weeks, on **Wednesday**, **27 August at 4.00 pm**

If you live out of zone and want to enrol a new Year 9 student for 2026, you must do this by the closing date.

Please note that the closing date applies to **ALL** out-of-zone families, even if you have a child at MRGS now, or had a child who used to come here, or you are a parent who went to MRGS.

Out of zone applications received after 4.00 pm Wednesday, 27 August, will be considered late and will **NOT** be included in the ballot.

Appointments



We request that, whenever possible, appointments be scheduled outside of school hours.

If your child has an appointment during school time, please let us know in advance by letting our attendance officer know before 9 am so we can arrange for the student to be ready at the time you require.

Please be mindful that sometimes it can take time to get your child from class, so letting us know in advance ensures you can make the appointment on time.

Punctuality

From the start of Week 3, we are removing the **9.04 am bell.** The 8.55 am bell will still ring, signalling to students that they should make their way to Period 1. Students should be ready for their classes for learning to begin at 9 am.

Punctuality is an important life skill. To support students to be on time to school, we will be sending home a text and email to let you know if your child has been late, or absent from Period 1. Please support your child to be on time for learning.

Nurses at MRGS

We are very lucky to have an enhanced based health service, with a fantastic team of nurses to support our students.



Learning remains the priority, and students are encouraged to utilise the nurses during break times, seeking support only during class time if they are extremely unwell.

Please keep your child home if they are unwell.

Proposed changes to NCEA: what you need to know as parents and caregivers

Proposed key changes by the Ministry of Education

- 1. Working with industry skills boards to make sure students in vocational pathways get the real-world knowledge and skills they need to succeed in the industry.
- 2. Removing Level 1 to focus on 2 years of assessment instead of 3, and introducing a new award that focuses specifically on foundational literacy, numeracy, te reo matatini, and pāngarau skills.
- **3.** Moving to a structured subject approach to assessment, and introducing required subjects to make sure students don't miss out on important learning.
- **4.** Making grades easier to understand, and changing how students get their qualifications so that they accurately represent students' knowledge and skills.

When will these changes happen?

The changes to the qualification will happen slowly.

The first students to get the new curriculum will be Year 9 students in 2026. Students who start using the new curriculum will receive the new qualification.

Students in Years 10 to 13 in 2026 will continue using the old curriculum. Students using the old curriculum will receive the NCEA qualification.



Hui 1 Te Puawaitanga o te Mātauranga

Students at the opening wānanga workshop for The Te Auaunga (Oakley Creek) Maramataka Project held in Te Puāwaitanga o te Mātauranga.

The project is a collaborative, cross-school initiative designed to reconnect ākonga (students) with their local environment through culturally grounded, hands-on learning about Te Auaunga (Oakley Creek). Based on a Tuakana Teina approach, the project brings together four schools: Dominion Road School, Mt Roskill Primary, Intermediate and Grammar Schools.





The project, kindly supported by Glasgow Engineering, Boffa Miskell and Comet centres on environmental monitoring and restoration, using the maramataka (Māori lunar calendar) as a framework for observing and understanding patterns in nature.

Students will engage in real-world investigations, data collection, and place-based learning that strengthens both scientific and cultural knowledge systems about Te Auaunga (Oakley Creek) and how to monitor and restore mauri and diversity in Te Auaunga.
